The topic of membership got me thinking about belonging, which got me thinking about commonalities, which got me thinking about how much divisiveness is in our world today.

It's a sad irony that advancements in technology that were designed, or at least marketed, as ways to bring us together have fueled a rise in anxiety, tribalism, and division unlike anything any of us have seen in our lifetimes.

When I was growing up, I didn't know my neighbor's political leanings or innermost thoughts because he didn't have a way to broadcast them every minute of the day. Now he does. Call it misguided nostalgia, but I miss the old days.

I think most of us are emotionally worn out by this sense of separateness. And like most things in life, the main thing we have power to change is our own attitude and perspective. I can't change what my neighbor thinks, but I can change how I view my neighbor.

I can choose to recognize what Gregory Boyle, a Jesuit priest who has spent his life working alongside gang members in Los Angeles, calls kinship. Our shared commonalities that, when recognized, lead to a crack in the sense of "us" and "them." Over time, that sense may collapse altogether.

It doesn't mean we'll agree with one another. It does mean we can recognize that we are all trying to do essentially the same thing: move toward well-being and away from pain in whatever way makes sense to us.

Put simply, we all just want to be safe and ok.

I once worked in a jail diversion program treating people with co-occurring serious mental illness and drug addiction. It was a long-term, intensive outpatient program with both group and individual therapy. We saw clients three to four days a week, sometimes for up to 18 months.

It was intense work. There was chaos, overdoses, and psychotic breaks. There was also laughter, insight, and recovery.

One thing became crystal clear to me through that work: even when people are trying to find happiness through harmful or self-destructive means, they are still doing the best they can with what they have in that particular moment.



There was a woman named Krista who had a heart of gold and a severe heroin addiction. She would get clean for a bit and then relapse, seemingly out of nowhere. She would find herself out on Jefferson Davis Highway, prostituting to scrounge up money for heroin.

It's easy to judge that. To see her actions as below our standard of conduct. And then to see her as less than in some way.

But here's the truth: you and I are not out prostituting for heroin because we are better than her. We just got luckier.

If we had her exact life experiences — her childhood trauma filled with abusive, neglectful caregivers — and her exact DNA — her genetic inclination towards addiction and bipolar disorder — we wouldn't be like her, we would be her.

Like it or not, genetics and conditioning are the two main ingredients that make up you, me, and Krista. Some of us get dealt a much better hand than others, and we play those hands accordingly. But the goal is still the same: to move toward relief, pleasure, and okayness, and away from pain, fear, and distress. Some people chase that through family, meaning, and community. Some chase it through heroin.

The entry way into kinship is reminding ourselves that just like me, this person is trying their best to be happy in life. Just like me, this person feels the same emotions, joys and fears. Just like me, this person will lose people that they love in life. Just like me, this person is sometimes tortured by their thoughts. And even if we are very different people from very different backgrounds, we are all swimming in the same soup.



Recognizing and remembering this isn't easy by the way. To a certain extent, I think tribalism is a human instinct. It was adaptive to be wary of the "other" tribe on the other side of the river. Better to be cautious and alive.

But like any trainable skill, recognizing our shared humanness and wishing the other well on that journey can start to take hold. We can start to have more of a choice in how we see others.

We don't train this mental muscle because it's the right "thing" to do by the way. It's simply a more pleasant way to go through life.

Recognizing our kinship with every other human won't eradicate our differences, but it will grow our commonalities. And as a result, maybe we will all be a little happier for this short time we are here.

THE 3 QUESTIONS BEFORE SAYING YES

Lawyers are trained to be responsive and accommodating. Those are strengths, but they can also lead to taking on more than is sustainable.

In practice, many “yeses” are not really decisions. They are quick responses in the moment. It might be a colleague inviting you to present at a lunch CLE, an email about joining a new committee, or an opportunity to volunteer at a charity event. These are all worthwhile experiences, which can make it harder to pause and consider them.

One way to slow that process down is to ask three quick questions before agreeing:

1. Do I actually have the time and energy for this, given what is already on my plate?
2. What will this new responsibility displace? Focus time, personal time, or other commitments?
3. Why am I saying yes? Is it because this matters to me, or because I feel pressure to be agreeable?

Even a brief pause can help turn a reflex into a more deliberate choice. You could say “let me check my schedule and get back to you” before automatically agreeing.

Boundaries are not about saying no more often. They are about being more intentional with the yeses you give.

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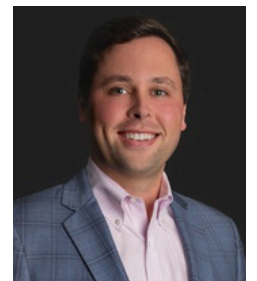

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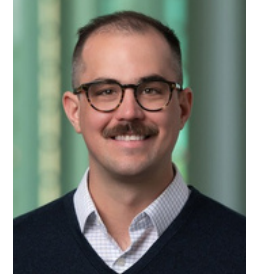


